

Crochet Dishcloth **PATTERN**

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Materials:

Cotton worsted weight yarn (4)

5mm crochet hook

Yarn needle

Abbreviations:

Chain: ch

Stitch: st

Slip stitch: ss

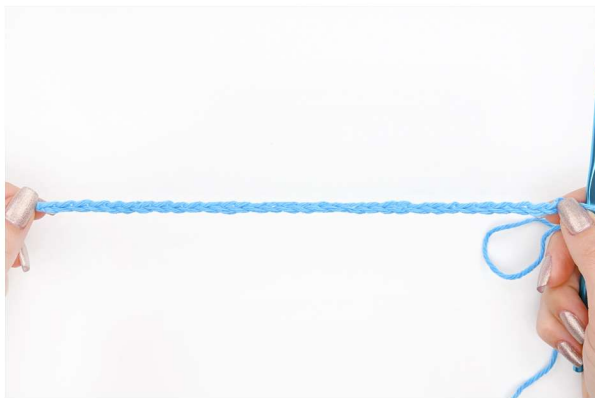
Single crochet: sc

Double crochet: dc

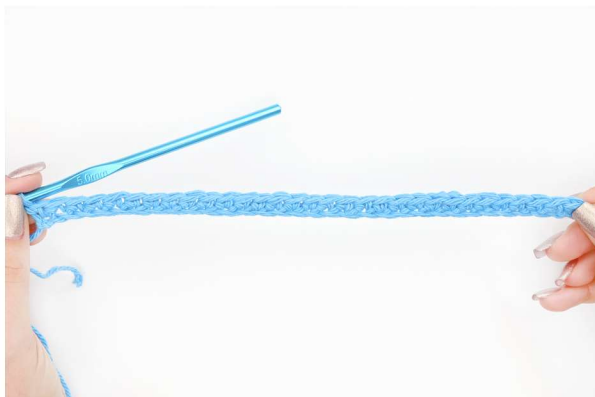
Pattern Notes:

- 1** We used Sugar 'n Cream cotton yarn. 1 ball can make 1.75 dishcloths using this pattern. You can make 2 if you make a smaller cloth.
- 2** To adjust the size of your cloth, you can reduce or increase the initial chains, keeping them in intervals of 5 +2 (i.e. 12, 17, 22, 27, etc).
- 3** The stitch combination we're using is called a "shell stitch".
- 4** If done correctly, your "5 dcs" should land in the "sc" of the previous row, and your "1 sc" should land in the 3rd dc of the "5 dc" cluster of the last row.

Crochet Dishcloth



1
Ch 32.



2
Insert 1 sc into each st across.



3
Ch 1 and insert 1 sc into the first st.



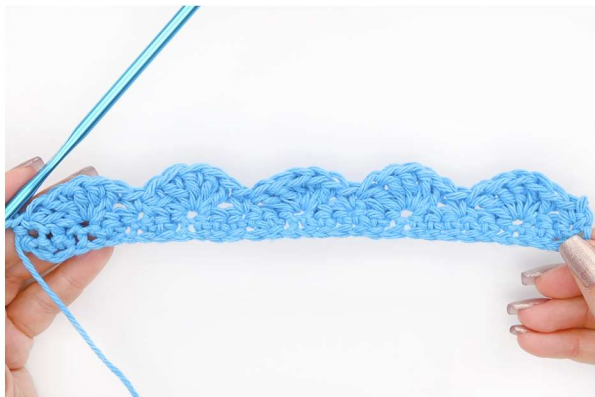
4
Skip 2 sts and insert 5 dc into the next st.

Skip 2 sts and insert 1 sc into the following st.



6

Repeat the pattern to the end of the row (continuing on to skip 2, 5 dc, skip 2, 1 sc, skip 2, etc).



7

Ch 3 (counts as a dc) and insert 2 dc into the first st.

This creates a "half shell".



8

Skip 2 sts and insert 1 sc into the next st.

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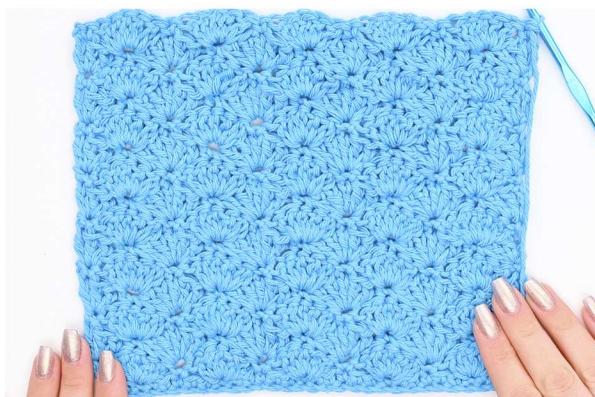

Skip 2 sts, and insert 5 dc into the next st.



10

Repeat "1 sc, skip 2, 5 dc, skip 2" to the end until you reach the last st. Insert 3 dc into the last st.



11

Repeat steps 3-10 for a total of 15 "shell stitch" rows, alternating between the two variations.

To start the border, ch 1 and insert 1 sc into each st across, stopping at the last st of the row.



13

In the last st, turn the corner by inserting the following sts: 2 sc, ch 1, 2 sc.

They should all be in the same stitch.



14

Rotate your work 90 degrees and continue to insert scs into the side of the cloth.

Note: It can be hard to determine where your sts go along the side, and how many to do. Typically you want 1 sc in each ch 1 or sc space, and 2 scs in each ch 3 or dc space along the side.



15

When you get to the last stitch along the side, insert 2 sc, ch 1, and 2 sc into that same stitch.



16

Turn your work 90 degrees, repeat the same pattern of scs into each st across the sides, and then "2 sc, ch 1, 2 sc" into each corner. Go around the whole cloth until you get to the very last st, next to your original ch 1.



17

In the last st, insert 2 sc, ch 1, and 1 sc. It should be in the same spot as the ch 1 from the first row.

The ch 1 counts as the 2nd sc in the corner st.

Ss into the first sc to end the round.



18

Repeat the border for a 2nd round, starting with a ch 1, and sc into each st all the way around. Follow the same pattern for the corners as the last row (2 sc, ch 1, 2 sc).

This time the corners will be placed in the "ch 1" spaces from the last round. You should have 2 extra sts on each side.



19

When you get to the last corner, do the full corner stitch (2 sc, 1 ch, 2 sc) as opposed to the last round when you skipped the 2nd sc in the corner st.

Ss into the first sc.



20

Cut and tie off your yarn.

Use the yarn needle to weave in your ends.
